State College Opening.

The Pennsylvania State College opened last week with over 250 students, of which sixty were in the Freshman class. A new chair of agriculture has been added for home study under Director Armsby, of the State experiment station. The chair of modern languages has been filled by Professor Thayer, of John's Hopkins university; Latin and Greek by Prof. Gill, and agriculture by Prof. Wallers, of the Missouri State university. Lieutenant McCaskey has been appointed commander-in chief of the military department.
