Then he pays the tariff tax on them, adds it to the price and the American people pay it. Who is benefitted? The American manufacturer only who makes inferior goods at a price a little lower than the foreign article and gets an enormous profit. Does he pay his employees higher wages because of his big profit? Not much. He buys his labor just as cheap as he can get it and it comes pouring in every day to glut the labor market and make wages low. What then does the tariff tax do for the laborer? It simply makes it harder for him to live.

We see some papers making the charge that Senator Meek is buying up paper needed for printing tickets, in order to create a corner in the ariicle, and to secure the printing for Centre and several other counties.
