A COOL SUICIDE.

AN EARLY MORNING SUICIDE AT BELLEFONTE.

Alexander Hoover Deliberately Fires a Ball Into His Brain at the Bellefonte Depot on Saturday Morning.

Bellefonte was thrown into an excitement on last Saturday morning by the sensational manner in which a self murder was committed at the Bellefonte passenger depot, by James Alexander Hoover.

Hoover had gone to the depot and purchased a ticket for Tyrone, intending to take the 5.35 train, and while waiting on the train he approached William Reasner, the night watchman, and requested of him a chew of tobacco.

A crowd quickly gathered and an undertaker was summoned, who took the body to the home of the parents with whom Hoover still resided. His father, David Hoover, resides near Roopsburg.

The suicide was sudden and deliberate. Hoover was in a good humor a few minutes before committing the deed. He was unmarried.
