CAUGHT BY THE TUMBLING SHAFT,

A Serious Accident to William Kuhn near Linden Hall.

AN EARLY MORNING SUICIDE AT BELLEFONTE. Alexander Hoover Deliberately Fires Ball Into His Brain at the Bellefonte Depot on Saturday Morning.

A COOL SUICIDE.

Bellefonte was thrown into an excitement on last Saturday morning by the sensational manner in which a self murder was committed at the Bellefonte passenger depot, by James Alexander Hoover. Hoover was a man aged about forty years, and had been working in a lumber yard near Pittsburg until July last, when he was injured about the head and breast by having a pile of lumber fall upon him. He recovered from the effects of his injuries, but the accident left his mind place protruded about two inches from in an affected state and to this cause the shaft. When Mr. Kuhn stepped can be attributed his rash act.

Hoover had gone to the depot and purchased a ticket for Tyrone, intending to take the 5.35 train, and while waiting on the train he approached William Reasner, the night watchman, and requested of him a chew of tobacco. Reasner has but one arm and he told Hoover to get the tobacco from his coat pocket. undertaker was summoned, who took the body to the home of the parents with whom Hoover still resided. His father, David Hoover, resides near Roopsburg. His body was prepared for burial and the funeral took place on Monday afternoon.

The suicide was sudden and deliberate. Hoover was in a good humor a deed. He was unmarried.
