"A wager for money that is based on a "catch" or a deceit, or a known certainty on one side, is discarded as void. No man of self-respect would accept money won on such a wager, and any person caught by such a deceit can with entire manliness refuse to pay. Any legitimate wager must have elements of chance on both sides, as all others mean, simply playing against the honest and unsuspecting with loaded dice or stacked cards.
