Sportive Hunters Set Fire to Oil in a Creek With Bad Results.

An immense quantity of oil escaped from a break in the Cresent Oil Pipe Company's line in Manor township on Monday, flowing into Miller's run. Several hunters, to have some fun, set fire to the oil, and the surface of the creek was at once a mass of flame. The entire run bore the appearance of a furnace, the flames mounting up fifty to a hundred feet. Large trees along the banks were destroyed in a few minutes, and the heat was so intense that limestone ledges were reduced to a chalky mass in an incredibly short time. To prevent the blazing oil reaching Conestoga creek, a large quantity in the upper part of the stream was dammed and set on fire, explosions following which could be heard over a mile. Considerable blazing fluid managed to get into Conestoga, but was prevented from doing much damage. Pipe line employes finally smothered the flames and repaired the leak in the pipe. The loss is large.


