NEW FENCE LAW.

The following is the full text of the fence law introduced by Senator Meek: An act to provide for the erection and regulation of proper fences in the several counties of this commonwealth. SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the senate and house of representatives of the commonwealth of Pennsylvania in

general assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, that all cleared lands used for agricultural and horticultural purposes, and public or private, within this commonwealth, shall be fenced within a substantial fence at least four feet high and erected in such manner as to prevent horses, cattle or sheep from trespassing upon said lands or inclosures. Sec. 2. Any person or persons not

with such fence as aforesaid shall not be entitled to compensation for crops destroyed or damages sustained by horses, cattle or sheep trespassing upon such fields or grounds. SEC. 3. All acts or parts of acts in-

consistent herewith are hereby repeal-




