It also provides for the completion of the improvement of onehalf of the width of the entire length of the road first before work is commenced on the other half.

The advocates of this measure recognize the fact that the revenues of the state are not sufficient to secure a large appropriation and are content to get a fair sum.

A large number of the rural members propose removing their support from the Niles tax bill, which, if it should become a law, they claim, will disarrange the present revenue system and decrease the state revenues, and will support the Burdick bill which taxes the bonded indeptedness as well as the capital stock of corporations. The advocates of this measure say it would provide immediate revenues in conformity with the present tax law.

THE FOLLOWING bills passed the house at Harrisburg finally: Authorizing water companies to relocate roads destroyed and to acquire land to preserve water supply from contamination; increasing the compensation of presidential electors and providing mileage therefor, and increasing the contingent expenses of said electors; amending the insurance laws of the state by requiring fire insurance companies or associations not incorporated under the laws of the state to pay to the treasurers of the several boroughs or townships an annual bonus on premiums on the insurance effected within the limits of such cities, boroughs and townships, and regulating the admission of inmates of the Soldiers' and Sailors, Home at Erie. No road law has passed yet-our legislators are all in a muddle over the different road laws before them.

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
