About three weeks ago Prof. J. C. Davis hired a horse and buggy from Hardman Phillips, of Yeagertown, for traveling on an exhibition tour giving sciopicon entertainments. Thursday last the Bald Eagle creek at Howard, Centre county, overflowed its banks and an accident resulted to Prof. Davis which proved fatal to the horse and came near drowning Mr. D. and a lad who traveled with him. They were driving about a mile east of Howard and crossing from a canal bridge to an iron bridge that spans the creek, the water between the bridges being almost three feet deep, and the horse stumbled and fell, upsetting the buggy, and the professor and the boy only escaped drowning by swimming. Mr. Davis exhibited pluck in attempting to rescue the horse by swimming along side of the animal for more than 100 yards. His heroic effort failed, and he was pulled out and taken to a residence near by in an unconscious condition. The horse was drowned and the buggy swept down stream. -Lewistown Free Press.
