THE INFANTA EULALIA has now reached our soil, and the REPORTER offers her the freedom of the country including Centre county. Eulalia is royal and we are all sovereigns hence there is little difference, so that she can esteem herself, and will be esteemed here, as good as any of us. All will be done to make the Infanta feel happy and at home, during her sojourn in this free land. Not an American soul but what feels otherwise than to extend to her greetings of welcome. We know she could travel from Maine to Florida and from Jersey to the Golden Gate without a guard, this would hardly be possible for her to do in her own Spain. Everything in this country is bigger than in Spain—our cities, our steamboats, our progress in arts and science, our capitol, our rivers, and our hearts. Welcome Eulalia.

A CONSTITUTIONAL difficulty is pointed out in the way of pensioning the judges on their retirement from office after a certain term of service by the Philadelphia Record, which has hitherto favored such pensioning. It is an impediment that can hardly be evaded. The constitution provides that "no bill shall be passed giving any extra compensation to any public officer, servant, employe, agent or contractor after services shall have been rendered or contract made." It also provides that "no appropriations, except for pensions or gratuities for military services, shall be made for charitable, educational or benevolent purposes to any person or community." The Record is of opinion there is nothing in the constitution inhibiting the city of Philadelphia from making provision for its own judges, and advises that it be done. And, of course, if the system of civil pensions is once started the firemen, the teachers and the police who have served long and faithfully should be cared for. Their need of pensions in old age is greater than that of the judiciary.

GOVERNOR FLOWER has signed the Anti-Trust bill passed by the recently adjourned Legislature of New York; and hereafter any member of a combination in that State having for its object the curtailment of production or monopoly in articles of general necessity will be liable to a heavy fine or a year's imprisonment, or both. The specious argument that trusts and combinations are the natural results of the development of modern business methods does not seem to have been effective at Albany. The truth is that the principle upon which all trusts and monopolies are founded is in deadly enmity with the instincts of a free people. They cannot survive side by side with free institutions.

DURING the interview with Secretary Gresham on Wednesday the Chinese Minister assured him that he believed the Chinese Government would not resort to any retaliatory measures and that there would be nothing done by his government that would disturb the present friendly relations between the United States and China.

INVESTMENTS that promise desirable returns should be received with caution. The world is full of scoundrels who make a good living out of unsophisticated greed.

PITTSBURG had a terrific storm of hail and rain Sunday afternoon. The damage done in ten minutes is put at one million dollars. Hailstones are reported to have been big as hen's eggs.

BILLS SIGNED.

Gov. Pattison has signed the following new laws: Requiring school directors to furnish books and other school supplies free of cost, known as the Farr free text book bill; to establish a medical council and three state boards of medical examiners; extending the power of the courts to appoint election officers in certain cases; providing for the immediate printing and distribution of unbound copies of the state laws as they are enacted; to establish boards of arbitration to settle matters of variance between capital and labor; to empower courts to fix the place of holding the general election; providing that voters shall cast their ballots at polling places inside the election district in which they are domiciled; directing county commissioners to bind and preserve weekly newspapers published in their counties.

EULALIA is pleased with her reception at Washington; she departs herself as a woman of sense, and that's what many ladies, not of royal blood, often fail to do.

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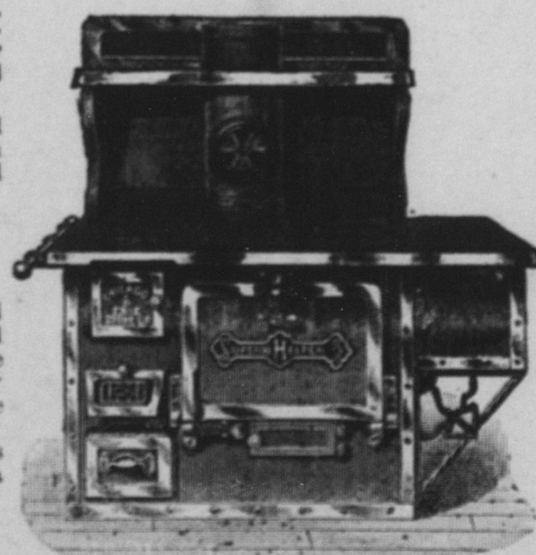

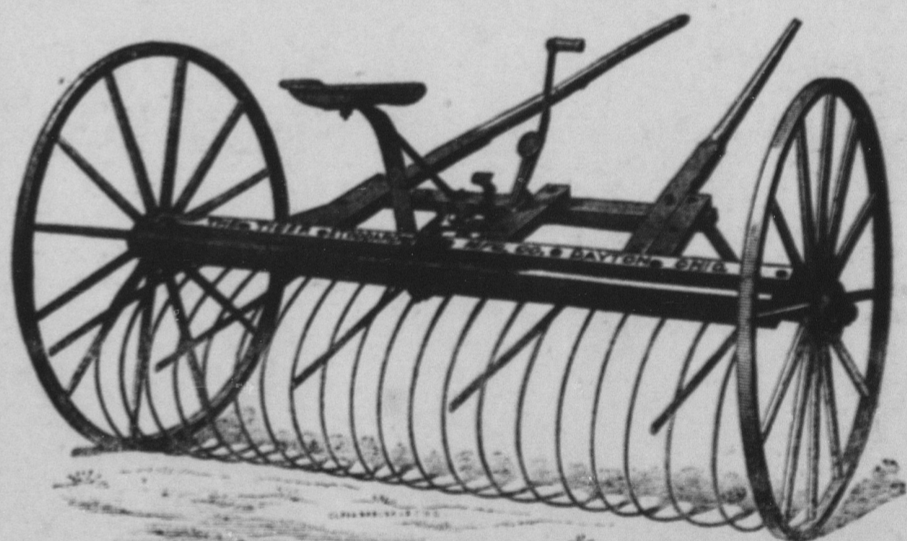

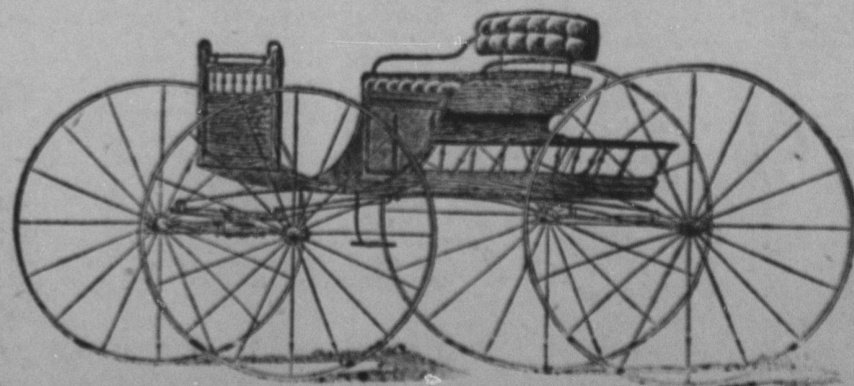
