THE FENCE LAW-TOO SPECIAL.

Governor Pattison still keeps furnishing our Senators and Representatives some views of statesmanship, with an eye to the Constitution. "The purpose of this bill," says the Governor, "is to enact a special fence law for the counties of Clearfield, Centre and Cameron, and to create a jurisdiction for the appraisement of damages in certain cases of trespass in those counties, different from the laws of the State, applicable to other geographical and political divisions thereof. It has been almost uniformly held by the executive of the Commonwealth, since the adoption of the new constitution, that laws of this kind were within the prohibition of the seventh section of its third article. It has been contended before the supreme court of the State that this relates only to political or general and not to domestic affairs of this kind but an exact and emphatic definition has been given to the term by the decision of the highest court, which its citizens, legislators and executive are alike bound to respect. The word 'affairs' was expressly chosen by the framers of the constitution to give to the prohibition upon local legislation a broad application, and the court expressly declares that the constitution prohibits the general assembly from making one law in one county regulating fences and a different law in adjoining counties. It has also been declared by this same high jurisdiction and court of last resort, that a law which excludes one county of the Commonwealth from its operation is local and special, as well as a law which includes but one, two or three. In view of these decisions there can be no doubt about the character of this legislation. It would be useless to encumber the statue books with it, when, upon the first test, it would be swept therefrom by the hand of the judiciary, to whom its construction would be submitted.

THE SILVER SITUATION.

In order to act understandingly with reference to any matter it is necessary to know something about it. Although the silver question is now one of the uppermost topics of discussion in all parts of the country, it is painful to observe how many writers and speakers betray their ignorance of facts. Secretary Carlisle who is a master of the art of lucid statement, in his little silver brief on the operation of the Sherman, law, printed in the telegraphic dispatches from Washington, Wednesday, has managed to present an array of figures which make their own argument. The loss to the Government on the purchased bullion now stored in its vaults by reason of depreciation in value is \$10,888,530. The silver certificates issued in payment for this bullion, though they are worth \$10,888,530 less than their face value, have nearly all been presented at the sub-treasuries and redeemed in gold, the gold having then been sent out of the country in payment of belances

due to foreigners. Is it any wonder that this sort of financiering has earned for us distrust at home and abroad? How long the Government shall thus be compelled to purchase silver bullion and increase the public debt by issuing coin obligations in payment for it is a question," as Secretary Carlisle sententiously observes, "which Congress alone can answer." 

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
