

A GAY LOTHARIO.

A Young Married Man of Bellefonte Elopes a Second Time.

A dispatch from Belmar, N. J., announces that Alton Twitmore, son of W. T. Twitmore, a prominent merchant of Bellefonte, had eloped from Belmar with Jennie, the 17 year old daughter of Charles Rash, of West Belmar. The couple was traced as far as Lancaster, this state, but there all trace was lost. Over two years ago the young man, owing to both being minors, ran off with Annie Gorman, daughter of Patrick Gorman, of Snow Shoe. They went to Camden, N. J., where they were married. From Camden they went to Pittsburg, where they lived for about six months, when a child was born to them.

About this time Twitmore was arrested for theft and spent a few months in jail. At the expiration of his sentence he and his wife came to Bellefonte and went to housekeeping, but his wild and restless spirit could not exist in the quietude of a happy domestic life, and he left his wife and went to Johnston, where he remained for several months, until located and brought back. Soon thereafter the young man again took French leave and no one was able to locate him. His wife gave her little daughter into the keeping of an unmarried sister, and herself went to Williamsport, where she is now employed as a domestic. In the meantime nothing had been learned of the whereabouts of Twitmore until the receipt of the dispatch relating his last exploit. It appears that he had gone to Belmar to spend the summer. He is a fine wheelman, and after meeting Miss Rash taught her to ride, and they were constantly together. The girl's parents, learning that Twitmore was a married man, tried hard to break up the intimacy, forbidding the man the house. The girl then met him outside and took bicycle trips with him. Recently Mrs. Rash took her daughter severely to task, when the girl cried bitterly, declared she could not live without Twitmore and threatened to shoot herself. It is presumed that Twitmore, upon learning this, persuaded the girl to elope, which she did.

SALARIES AND FEES.

Itemized Statements Must be Kept Each Day.

The county officials have received a circular letter from Auditor General Gregg directing that hereafter an itemized statement must be made of all fees received each day. Fifty per cent. of all moneys in excess of \$2,000 of office expenses must be remitted to the state. The circular is dated June 23, 1893, and is Attorney General Hensel's opinion in reply to the auditor general's inquiry. The attorney general cites several acts bearing on the question, from the one of March 10, 1810, down to March 31, 1876. The circular closes as follows: "Commencing with the year 1893, no clerk hire or expenses of office will be allowed in the annual settlement of the accounts of the county officers, except the auditor's report be accompanied by itemized and properly receipted vouchers accounting for all clerk hire and office expenses to be deducted from the fees received. County officers are instructed to take receipt for all money paid for clerk hire and expenses of office, the originals of which are to be forwarded with the auditor's report for the year 1893, and annually thereafter."

Experiment Station Notes.

The results of some experiment upon the comparative digestibility of green corn fodder, and of the same material field cured and ensilaged, are presented in the forthcoming report of the Station. These results, when compared with those of similar experiments at this station and elsewhere, modify some previous conclusions as to the influence of ensilage upon the digestibility of corn. Contrary to the generally accepted opinion, it was found that in certain cases the process of ensilage increased the digestibility of the woody fiber of the corn. It was also found, however, that this result was only reached when the amount of fermentation and consequent loss in the silo was excessive, and that under more normal conditions, both ensilage and field curing somewhat decrease the digestibility of corn. Evidence is constantly accumulating that the undoubted great value of ensilage in progressive farming is not due to any mysterious action of the silo upon the fodder, but is an economic advantage arising from the facts, first, that the corn crop produces a very large amount of food per acre, and, second, that the silo preserves this food with comparatively little loss in a palatable and succulent condition, so that it is eaten with little or no waste.

The last legislature passed an act, which has been approved by the Governor, appropriating the sum of \$3000 a year for two years to the Experiment Station "For the purpose of conducting experiments and investigations in the culture, curing and preparation of tobacco." These experiments, which have already been initiated at two points in Lancaster county are to be under the management of the Tobacco Growers' Society of Lancaster county and such other responsible associations as may care to engage in such work, but subject to the direction and control of the station. The actual work of experimentation is to be carried on by the respective associations, but the analyses and investigations connected therewith are to be made by the Station and the results of the experiments published in its annual report. It is further provided that no part of the appropriation shall be used for the purchase of land, and that experiments shall be carried on under the act in not less than two, nor more than five separate localities. Provision is also made for the publication of results in the form of bulletins, one copy of each of which is to be sent to every newspaper in the state.

The legislature also included in the appropriations for the Pennsylvania State College the sum of \$2000 per year for two years for the current expenses of the Agricultural Department of the College. This appropriation is for the teaching work of the College, and not for the experimental work in agriculture.
