HABEAS CORPUSPROCEEDINGS IN THE WAHN CASE.

Bail For His Appearance,-To be Tried at August Court.

On Monday morning John W. Wahn who is confined in the county jail on the charge of malpractice upon the person of Mrs. Winkleman, who died several months ago near Nittany Hall, was given a habeas corpus hearing before Judge Furst.

District Attorney Singer is assisted by Judge Orvis in preparing the indictment, and Wahn was represented Of the Reformed Church at the Pienie by attorneys Reeder and Chambers. A large number of witnesses were heard, but at the request of Judge Orvis, the evidence given at the hearing, will not be published. The hearing continued until Monday afternoon a week or so.

The case promises to be an interesting and complicated one, and will be long drawn out. Among the witnesses at the proceedings were Mrs. Winkleman's husband, physicians, and others, and the witness list was large.
