AN IMPRACTICABLE ISSUE.

There is unquestionably an overwhelming sentiment in favor of the continued use of silver as part of the metallic currency of the country says the *Pittsburg Post*, and a hope that a way will be found to place it on an equality with gold at the mints in the matter of coinage. The people are in favor of the bi-metallic standard, and opposed to the recognition of gold as the signal standard of values. But on one point a revolution has taken place in public sentiment, and it is the very practicable one that this cannot be done by the United States alone, and that the suspension of silver purchases by this country at this time is in furtherance of an international arrangement for the coinage of silver.

The passage of the Sherman repeal bill no more demonetizes silver than it has been demonetized by the depreciation in the value of silver in the markets of the world. That is the test after all. The silverites virtually admit this when they propose a compromise for the coinage of silver at the ratio of 20 to 1. That is a recognition of the gold value of silver as a determining factor. If not, why not retain the existing legal ratio of 16 to 1?

Another fact is to be considered. The United States have now in circulation or in the treasury over five hundred millions of silver. It is a full legal tender. The repeal of the Sherman law will in no wise affect the legal tender quality of this great amount of money. On the contrary the pledge is made to maintain it at the legal parity with gold. There is no objection to that. It is part of the repealing bill that passed the house, and will be part of any bill that goes to the president for his approval. No legislation is proposed affecting the legal tender quality of the silver coinage, but on the other hand there is the positive command on the executive officers of the government that it must be maintained at an equality with gold.

These are the reasons that have induced so many of the friends of the free coinage of silver, by international arrangement, to give their advocacy to the repeal of the Sherman law. They do not in the interest of silver as a money metal, and to prevent, by the continuous and unlimited purchases of silver, the country falling to a single silver standard, with the disappearance of gold from its currency supply.

The United States cannot maintain silver alone at its present legal coinage value. The attempt would be disastrous to all interests. There was nearly \$200,000,000 of silver produced last year, estimated at its coinage value, of which the United States mined \$75,000,000. This vast sum cannot be utilized as money by any one nation. The attempt would be ruin.

THE CLEARFIELD Spirit sees the hand of Quay working against the re-election of Judge Krebs in that judicial district. A prominent Republican who means to support Judge Krebs largely in condemnation of the appearance of Quay and Quay methods, says that "the Republicans of the state are watching the contest for judge in this county more closely than any other local fight in Pennsylvania."

Good Republican Advice.

Pittsburg Times, Rep.: Of course the adoption of a cloture rule in the senate, in order to bring the silver purchase repeal to a vote, would insure that the Federal elections repeal and the Democratic tariff bill which the House may pass can also be brought to a vote, in spite of any dilatory tactics which may be interposed. 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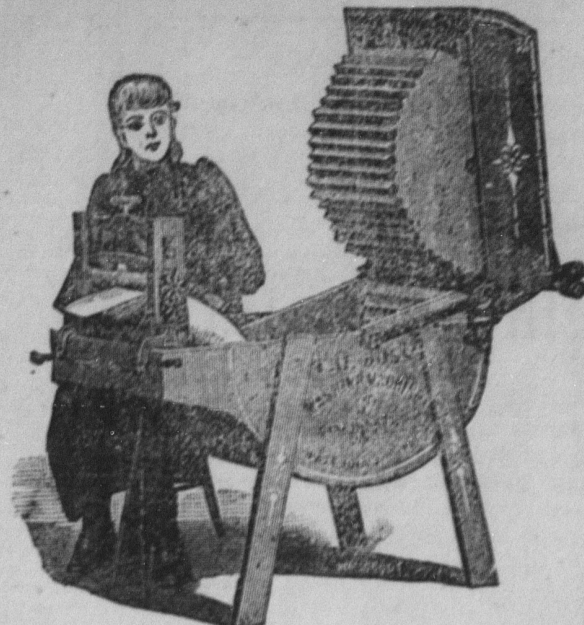
