Wednesday last was the 43rd anniversary of the running of the first passenger car of the Pennsylvania railroad over the mountains from Altoona to Johnstown. The Hollidaysburg correspondent of the Tribune, in referring to the fact, says: The main line of the Pennsylvania railroad, having just been opened as far west as Altoona, the Portage track was utilized to convey passengers over the mountain for some four years, until the present route from Altoona could be completed. At that time there was no accommodation for change of cars in the wild forest surrounding Y switches, and the crews from Hollidaysburg waited in their cars until the arrival of the passenger car and engine from Altoona. A single eight-wheeled passenger car, of but little greater capacity than the street cars of the present day, sufficed to carry the passengers, and it was usually not more than half filled. The first winter no passengers were carried over the mountain at night, and tourists arriving at Duncansville in the evening were taken to Hollidaysburg, where they could remain until morning, when they could continue their journey. From that time the canal packet boats, which had hitherto carried all through passengers, were discontinued and the travel deserted the canal. This inaugurated the railroad through this state, which has since grown to its present immense proportions. Major S. S. Barr, of this borough, was one of the first passenger conductors of that period, and he and Captain S. B. Seeley, of Pittsburg, are the only known surviving conductors of those early days.

In 1860 more than one-half of all the people in this country were engaged in agricultural pursuits. 
