**DEFEYING THE PEOPLE.**

At the last presidential election the people of the United States, by an unprecedented majority declared they wanted the Sherman silver purchasing law repealed, and in addition both parties in their platforms demanded the repeal.

The silver senators who are now endeavoring to prevent the repeal by consuming time in useless speech-making, are a minority rebelling against the expressed will of the people.

At the same election the people by an immense majority spoke in favor of the repeal of the McKinley protective tariff. Let this demand of the people be carried out—obstruction will be defiance of the will of the American people.

At the same election, by a mighty majority, the American people demanded the repeal of the Force Bill. It would be rebelling against the wishes of the people to stand in the way of a prompt repeal of that un-American measure.

No true patriot in congress will refuse to obey the wishes of the people in regard to the three laws above mentioned.

**CLEMENT'S MILL BURNED.**

A Fire Last Night Which Was the Work of an Incendiary.

Mr. George F. Clement's feed mill at the lower end of town was discovered on fire last night, Wednesday, about midnight, and was totally destroyed. Mr. D. F. Luse, who lives one square away, was the first to give the alarm, he having discovered it from his bed chamber; he says it started on the outside of the building, hence must have been set on fire, and was just beginning to burn.

The mill was a small two-story frame with engine shed attached, and was only erected about a year ago. The mill had not been running since last spring. In it were stored a new wind-pump, a number of well hydrants, three-fourths of a car load of coal, and some other articles.

In close proximity to the burning mill were several stables which were only saved by the free application of water. From the point at which the fire started it is evident that the fire was the work of an incendiary, and had been started from the outside. The total loss is about \$2400, on which there is an insurance of about \$1200, in some cash company.
