It is a very general impression among dwellers in country districts, and even among a great many of those who should be better informed on such subjects, that "flickers" or yellowhammers, as they are termed by the game laws, and meadow larks are fair game at any and all seasons. There are also several other birds that are commonly shot under the belief that there is "no law on them."

As a matter of fact, there are very few birds which can be shot with impunity in the state of Pennsylvania. The law of '89 was drawn up so as to specify as carefully as possible just what might be shot during certain seasons. To prevent all further mistakes, the names of such birds as it was lawful to shoot at certain seasons | yet we are assured that our loss is his of the year were set out in full. By some oversight, the name of the reed bird was left out, so in '91 the law was amended to read as follows:

"Section 1. Be it enacted, etc., That no person in any of the counties of this commonwealth shall kill, wound, trap, net, snare, catch with birdlime or with any similar substance, poison or drug any bird of song, or any linnet, bluebird, yellowhammer, yellow bird, thrush, woodpecker, catbird, peewee, martin, bluejay, oriole, kildeer, snow- gelical. bird grassbird, grossbeak, bobolink, phoebe-bird, humming-bird, wren, robin, meadowlark, night-hawk, startling, or any wild bird, other than a game bird. Nor shall any person purchase, or have in possession, or expose for sale, any of the aforesaid song and wild birds or any part thereof after they shall have been killed. For the purposes of this act, the following shall be considered game birds: The antidae, commonly known as swans, geese, brant and river and sea ducks; the rallidae, commonly known as rails, coots, mud hens and gallinules; the limicolae, commonly known as shore birds, plovers, surf-birds, snipe, woodcock, sandpipers, tattlers and curlews; the gallinae, commonly known as wild turkeys, grouse, prairie chicken, pheasant, partridge and quail; the columbae, commonly known as doves, and wild pigeons, and the birds commonly known as reed-birds."

Another section, No. 6, of the above mentioned act of '89 was also amended to read as follows:

"Section 6, The English or European house sparrow, and the various species of hawks, owls and crows, are not included among the birds protected by this act."

Section 8 was also amended so that one-half of the penalty for breaches of the law should be paid to the inform-
