An examination of the prices of wool at Boston the controlling market of the United States, will show that the best average prices were obtained when wool was "practically free of duty. Previous to 1857 there was a tariff of 30 per cent., but the tariff fact of that year admitted the fine wools of South America, Australia, and the Cape of Good hope free. Virtually the Act of 1857 put wool fon the free list, and it there remained until after the war. In 1856 wool brought 60 cts. a pound in the Boston market, and after duties were removed the price ranged as follows :

1857 . . 60 cents. 1863 . . 70 cts. 1858 . . 55 cents. . 1864 . . . 75 cts.






