In 1886 the price for mining coal at Mr. Grow's mines at Hardscrabble, Clarion Co., was fifty-five cents a ton. The miners in Grow's employ together with the other miners in that vicinity, asked for an advance from fiftyfive and sixty cents per ton to seventy cents, the same as paid in the Reynoldsville region. All the operators met with their men with the exception of Mr. Grow, and agreed to grant an advance, and did so. Grow refused to treat with his men or grant the er, David L. Bartges. advance, and after a hard struggle, compelled them to go to work at fiftyfive cents a ton, the price he had always paid. The effect of this act on the part of Grow was to cause the other operators to reduce the wages paid their men from seventy cents to sixtyfive cents a ton, that being ten cents more a ton than Grow was paying his miners for digging the same quality of

Mr. Grow is a fit subject to go to congress to represent Pennsylvania workingmen and prevent a reduction in wages. His motto undoubtedly is 'Protection for Grow only."

An Important Decision.

SUICIDE PROM DESPONDENCY.

A Huntingdon Man Shoots Himself in the Presence of his Wife and Child,

While lying on his bed with his young wife on one side of him and his ten-months-old babe on the other George L. McCrum, of Huntingdon, on Sunday pulled a revolver from under the pillow and fired a 38-calibre ball into his brain. He died almost instantly. McCrum had been out of work for several weeks and had become despondent.

He had frequently spoken of committing suicide, and only last Friday was about to cut his throat with a razor, when he was discovered by his wife, who succeeded in getting the weapon away from him. When found on Sunday his wife was in a faint and the little babe was bathing its hands in the blood from the wound in the father's face.
