SAMUEL MOYER.

A Former Resident of Penns Valley Dies in Kansas.

Samuel Moyer, who left this county some years ago, died in Hiawatha, Kansas, and was buried January 1st, 1894. He left this valley about twenty-nine years ago. He lived at Spring Bank, in Miles township, about thirty years, and afterwards on the farm of Jacob Moyer, at Linden Hall, some thirteen years. He was born in Lebanon county, Pa., and was aged eighty-three years, 11 months and 18 days. He was the father of seventeen children, of whom fourteen are still living, four sons and ten daughters. A few days before he took sick he expressed the wish that at his funeral Romans 8:12 might be taken as his text, which was done. He was a devoted member of the Reformed church. His wife died some twenty-six years ago, in Stephenson county, Ill. At his request his remains were taken to Ill. for burial beside his wife.

Bible Printed in Somerset.

While engaged in the work of appraising the personal effects of the late Levi Yoder, of Conemaugh township, the appraisers came across an old German Bible which was printed in 1813. The Bible was printed by Gottlieb Goeb, who for a number of years conducted a printing establishment in that place in the early years of the present century, his specialty being Bibles. Mr. Goeb sold his printing office to J. B. Gruber, who continued the business, making a specialty of the publication of almanacs. Mr. Gruber eventually moved to Bedford and thence to Hagerstown, where he continued the publication of his almanacs, which have now become famous as the "Hagerstown Almanac." The Bible mentioned above would be a valuable addition to the collection of any local bibliophile.—Somerset Democrat.

An Engine's Cough.

The cough or puff of a railway engine is due to the abrupt emission of waste steam up the stack. When moving slowly the coughs can, of course, be heard following each other quite distinctly, but when speed is put on puffs come out one after another much more rapidly and when 18 coughs a second are produced they cannot be separately distinguished by the ear. A locomotive running at the rate of nearly 70 miles an hour gives out 20 puffs of steam every second—that is 10 for each of its two cylinders.—Detroit Journal.
