TABERNACLE BURNED.

Talmage's Church in Reims.—Loss Over a Million Dollars.

For the third time fire has razed the tabernacle of Dr. Talmage's Brooklyn congregation. On Sunday last flames burst out at noon just after the morning service and before they were subdued they had destroyed an adjoining hotel and damaged a number of residences.

The fire started in the great organ and was caused by an electric light wire. Fortunately it started shortly after noon when all the 6000 worshippers at the morning service had left, excepting some less than a hundred, as the fire spread so rapidly that amid the panic many would not have gotten out and would have been burnt.

The total loss by the fire is upwards of 2 million dollars, the loss to the congregation is over 1 million and the insurance only \$150,000. The Trustees have resolved to rebuild at once and complete the new edifice within a year.

The two previous churches were also destroyed by fire on Sundays.

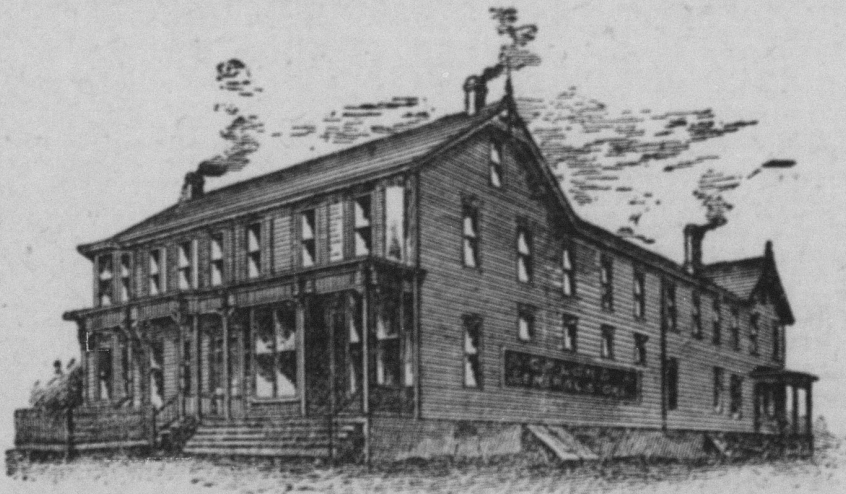
