The Business Situation.

Dunn's Review for the last week says: The strikes begin to have a serious though it is assumed only a temporary effect. The number of works depending upon supplies of bituminous coal or coke for fuel is large, and quite a considerable proportion of them have already been compelled to stop operations. No doubt the proportion is larger in the iron and steel manufacture than in any other business, but nearly a third in capacity of the iron furnaces at work a month ago appear to have closed. Some railroads at the West are embarrassed, and textile works of some importance must close soon unless the strike ceases. The movement of so-called armies of unemployed on Washington has caused little excitement, and is less important or significant than the outward movement of specie, which shows shrinking foreign demand for products and further withdrawal of foreign capital. But neither striker nor foreign distrust long retard the progress of this country.

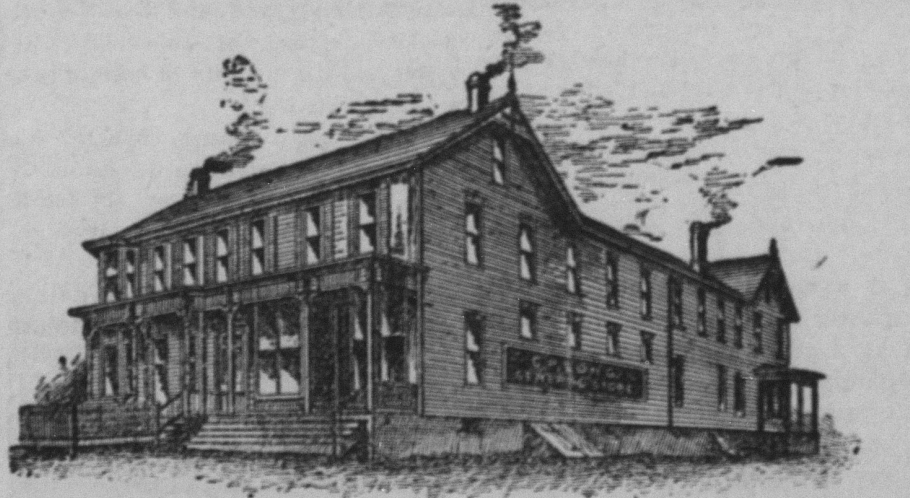
