A BANK LOOTED.

The revelations in the Millintown bank case prove that the concern was insolvent as far back as eighteen years, and that the worthless condition of the institution was purposely kept hidden by an outward show of soundness, and by making false reports each year to cover the real rottenness of the bank. In this fraudulent manner it managed to continue for eighteen years as a skinflint concern, taking in the deposits of its neighbors and squandering them in stock speculations.

Such dishonest bank officials flourish a few years by speculating in stocks and other dabbles, using other people's money left in bank on deposit. This is the history of pretty nearly all looted banks—ruined by using the depositor's money for private speculations.

Whenever you see those employed in banks, going outside of their business and speculating and gambling, make up your minds that the money of the depositors is being used for illegitimate purposes, and you want to take your money out of it, before it is too late.

A bank carried on with the purpose of skinning and speculations, is the worst curse that can be inflicted upon a neighborhood, and that is just what the Millintown bank proved to be and scores before it, and others will yet turn out to be, where the persons in the bank go into speculations and swindles.

A bank carried on with honest purposes is a convenience to a neighborhood; but where it is conducted upon the guerilla system it is sure, sooner or later, to turn out disastrously to those who put their money in it. In dealing with a bank, see whether those in it are men of pure character, free from speculation, and schemes to swindle its neighbors before you put your money there.

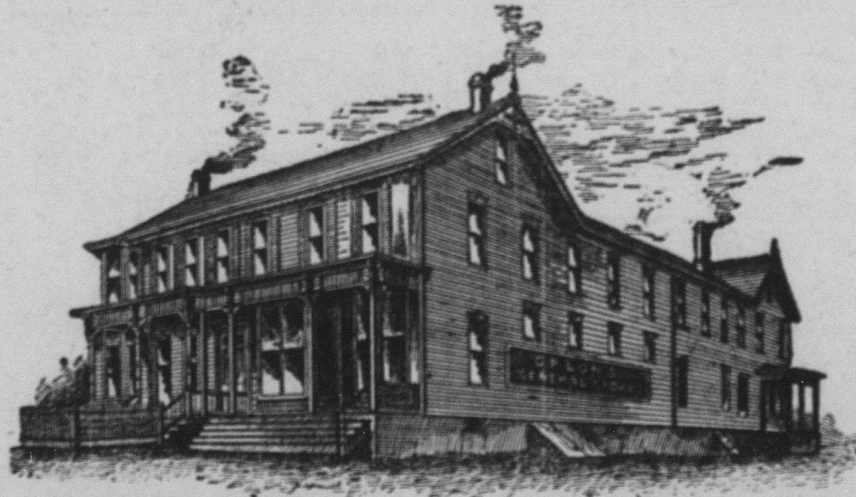
