A statement of the bank's condition is still refused but the directors continue to profess their belief in its solvency.

The uncertainty over the closing of the bank has been increased by the discovery that \$63,000 of Blair county's funds are deposited in the Western national bank of Philadelphia.

Orders have been issued by the Pennsylvania to its special officers to cause the arrest of all persons who are hereafter found stealing rides.

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
