

WOOL—'ALL WOOL.'

Wool is going up in price in spite of the Hastings calamity howl. Under former free wool Democratic tariffs, wool always sold higher than under high protective tariffs.

Alex. Harmon, of Woodfield, O., the centre of a large wool trade, a few days ago sold 10,000 pounds of wool at 20 cents, and was offered as much for the rest of his clip, but he refused, believing wool would go still higher.

Clint & Pfalzgraff, of the same county, Monroe, have sold their wool lately at 23 cents, it was not as desirable a clip as Harmon's.

Miller & Co., of Beallsville, O., are offering 20 and 21 cents, but are getting no wool, can't get it under 23.

From Washington, Pa., the greatest wool producing section of our state, washed wool is selling at 20 and 21 cts. Markel & Co., of Monongahela, have instructed their country agents to purchase 350,000 pounds at from 20 to 25 cents, according to grade.

Wool has sold in the West Virginia panhandle from 20 to 23 cents as per reports. Most of the wool buyers are Republicans and they have been trying to bulldoze wool down to 15 cents, for two reasons, viz, to make profit for themselves and get a chance to manufacture a calamity howl and try to draw the wool over the farmer's eyes.

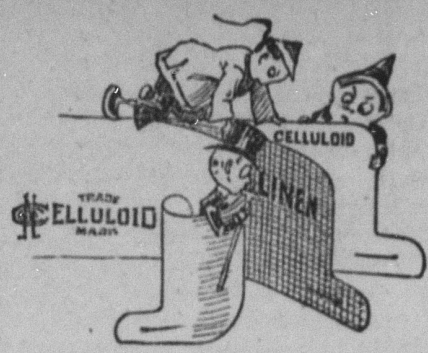

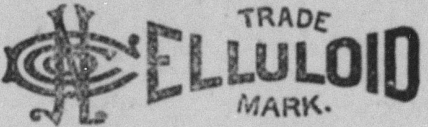
