ANOTHER IDOL SMASHED.

The Republicans have always clamored that unless there was a federal election law their party stood no chance of a fair vote and an honest count in New York or in the Southern States.

One of the demands of recent Democratic National Conventions was that these laws should be repealed outright and the control of the suffrage left with the people of the states, who had exercised it for a hundred years with the best results as to honest elections.

And what has been the result? At the first Congressional election held in this country for nearly thirty years with the supervisors and deputy marshals entirely eliminated, having been absolutely wiped out as factors in controlling Congressional elections, the Republicans have made such gains, on a free and untrammelled vote, entirely under the regulation of the state laws as never before in the history of that party.

Here again have the policy and principle of the Democratic party been vindicated. If we cannot get fair elections in this country through state and local authority and supervision, it is impossible under the swaggering bulldozing of partisan supervisors and deputies. If the Republicans had had their way the infamous force bill would have been on the statute books controlling the late elections.

One of our local Republican papers glories over the repeal of the federal election laws and the results that have followed. It doesn't realize the villainess of the clamor its party has been propagating for years to maintain and enlarge these laws for the basest of partisan purposes.

So, too, as to the Wilson tariff law. It also is accepted. While as for that dreary wreck, McKinleyism, it is not thought worthy of a funeral dirge, but sinks into its lonely grave unwept, unhonored and unsung.

ONE of the elected Republican assembly candidates kicks because his party organ sends him a moderate bill for newspaper work done to aid his election, every week during the campaign.

QUAY, according to a Pittsburgh Republican organ, has been turned down three times by Gov. Hastings, in asking for appointments for his friends. Let Hastings make up his mind not to have the bosses dictate to him and he will gain friends.

POLITICS is quiet, the calamity howl is dead, and all the talk in this county has simmered down to big hogs which are about all dead too and gone to salt pickle. This is a great country.

THE new governor is now having a taste of the bitter end of his cyclone of success. The influential fellows are after him for their reward; they waded up to their ears in the slum of politics to elect Gen. Hastings, and 5000 heels have filed applications for the 25 places the new governor will have to dispose of, so there will be just 4975 disappointed ones, big and little, who are mad, others getting ready to get mad swear.

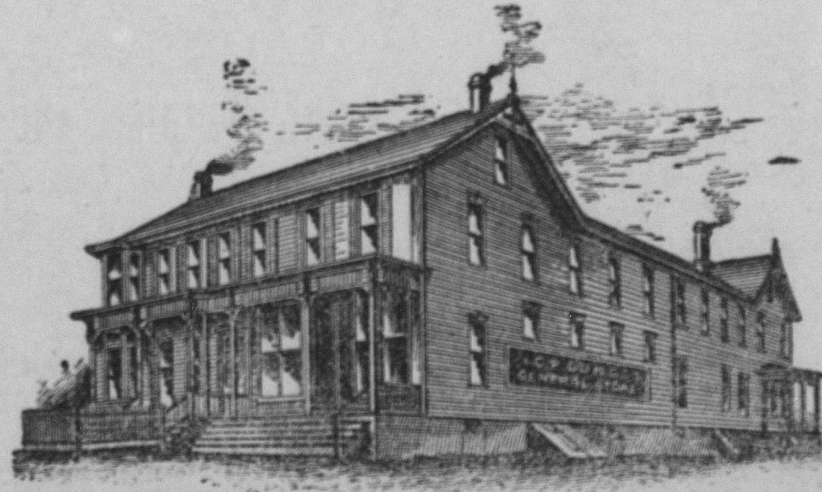
