ANOTHER IDOL SMASHED.

The Republicans have always clamored that unless there was a federal election law their party stood no chance of a fair vote and an honest count in New York or in the Southern states. So they have maintained since the dawn of the so-called reconstruction era a cumbrous system of federal supervisors, deputy marshals, chief supervisors and all sorts of heelers at the polls, costing many millions of dollars to enforce a partisan and hated law. It is supposed that "Johnny" Davenport, who has arrested thousands in New York without warrant and discharged them without trial, has drawn from the Federal Treasury during the last twenty years fully a million of dollars. In the south these federal election laws were chiefly used in stirring up sectional and race hatreds. It was upon the perjured testimony of partisan officials under these laws that the Presidency was stolen from Samuel J. Tilden in 1876.

One of the demands of recent Democratic National Conventions was that these laws should be repealed outright and the control of the suffrage left with the people of the states, who had exercised it for a hundred years with the best results as to honest elections. The Republicans met this with a demand for even more arbitrary and oppressive meddling legislation. That was embodied in the infamous force bill, and Czar Reed violently urged here in Pittsburg in its justification in perpetuating the power of this inthat "we Republicans must do our own registration, our own counting and our own certification." On this issue, as on McKinleyism, they were overwhelmingly defeated at the polls. The first act of the Democratic Congress, after it had repealed the Sherman silver purchase law, was to repeal the federal election laws. Repeal was opposed by the Republicans of the Senate and the House with the usual dreary declamation that without such laws there could be no fair election for Congressmen in New York or at the south. The Democrats said trust the people of the states.

And what has been the result? At the first Congressional election held in this country for nearly thirty years with the supervisors and deputy marshals entirely eliminated, having been absolutely wiped out as factors in controlling Congressional elections, the Republicans have made such gains, on a free and untrammeled vote, entirely under the regulation of the state laws as never before in the history of that

Here again have the policy and principle of the Democratic party been vindicated. If we cannot get fair elections in this country through state and local authority and supervision, it is impossible under the swaggering bulldozing of partisan supervisors and deputies. If the Republicans had had their way the infamous force bill would have been on the statute books controlling the late elections. Under such conditions the "solid south" would have remained solid. But with a free and unrestrained vote, under state laws, the south is losing its solidity. The Democrats have always conceded that would be a result. The late election demonstrated it. But what becomes of the booby shirt yawping on this subject we have heard for years? Nothing but a stale record of partisan falsehood and sectional hatreds to shame for generations their inventors.

One of our local Republican papers glories over the repeal of the federal election laws and the results that have followed. It doesn't realize the vileness of the clamor its party has been propagating for years to maintain and Bellefonte. enlarge these laws for the basest of partisan purposes.

So, too, as to the Wilson tariff law. It also is accepted. While as for that dreary wreck, McKinleyism, it is not thought worthy of a funeral dirge, but . sinks into its lonely grave unwept, unhonored and unsung.
