To fill the vacancy created by the rethe assets of the bank, including the double liability of stockholders, with a guarantee fund made up by all the banks, the government continuing to guarantee to redeem all notes as at present. This is practically the Baltimore plan. It is simple. It is good, as far as it goes, and it goes far enough to begin with, its workings and the wisdom of impartial experts could be left to enlarge upon the plan.

TAXING THE CORPORATIONS.

The adoption of the revenue bill prepared by the subcommittee of the state tax conference by the conference at its meeting in Harrisburg on December 27 is highly probable. Of the measure it is said by one who assisted in framing it that it would reduce the local taxation about \$2,500,000 a year as compared with the operations of the present revenue law. The corporations would have to pay about \$2,000,000 more than they have been obliged to contribute to the state treasury under existing legislation, which added considerably to their taxes. The ground work of the bill is to make corporations pay enough taxes to meet the state government expenses. One of its provisions is that all the revenue derived from the tax on personal property be paid to the counties in which it is collected. Under the present law the state is entitled to one-fourth the aggregate amount. For the year ended November 30 last, personal property paid in taxes \$2,386,750.99, of which the state received nearly \$600,000. The tax conference committee's bill also diverts from the state treasury to the local treasuries the tax on writs, wills, deeds, etc., which last year aggregated \$162,428.52.


