The Village of Howard all Torn Up Over

The unusual proceeding of writs of attachment to be followed by an execution issued against a church will take place at Howard. It will be the final proceeding in one of the most bitter and prolonged church fights ever recorded, and one without any precedent. The case is that of the Disciple church, in the village of Howard, for the possession of which two factions, known as the Long-Lucas faction and the Harvey-Gardner faction have been contesting for almost four years, until the costs in the case have been piled up to over \$600-more than the building in dispute is worth. and now the sheriff of Centre county has two writs to execute, one issued by the plaintiffs to regain possession of the property and the other a writ of execution issued by the court to recover the amount of the costs.

The case was then carried to the Supreme Court, and Justice Dean set aside the ruling of the associates. In the mean time the defendants executed a judgment against the

church property. The latest proceeding occurred when Judge Love issued a writ for the collection of costs in the case, and also refused to grant an injunction to the defendants to set aside the master's decision. The case has now been appealed by the defendants to the Supreme Court to be tried on its merits, and the outcome is awaited with feverish interest. Meantime the sheriff is in a dilemma to know whether he can serve his writs or not-the plaintiffs demanding him to do so and the defendants threatening to make trouble if he proceeds.
