THE FREEDOM OF THE SEAS.

The importance of Secretary Gresham's dispatch concerning the Alliance freedom of commerce, irrespective of the traditional fiction of the three-mile limit. What is commonly known as international law is not a definite code of enactments, but rather the accepted rule, written or unwritten, of courtesy and fair dealing among nations, and like the unwritten law of personal conduct it has developed gradually with the advance of civilization. Originally there was no law between nations the other whatever it dared to do. 




