The President has appointed attorney-general Olney as secretary of state in place of Walter Q. Gresham, dec'd.

The "Watchman's" centennial issue was interesting in its illustrations. The "Democrat" and the "Gazette" also put out interesting Centennial issues.

A STRONG effort is being made to have Thomas H. Murray, of Clearfield, appointed as one of the seven judges to the newly created Superior Court. He has strong endorsements.

Ex-gov. Campbell having been requested, has consented to again run as the Democratic candidate for Governor of Ohio, against Bushnell. Things will now hum in Ohio, "the Campbell's are coming."

FULLY one-half of the nincompoops of the Legislature cannot tell you today what the Monroe Doctrine is, and yet they voted with a yell to censure the Cleveland administration for its patriotic dealings in the Nicaraguan affair. "What fools these mortals be."

The adjournment of the legislature was simply a bitter row between two warring Republican factions—Quay and his lieutenants on one side, and the Hastings-Penrose-Martin combine on the other. The fierce winding-up fight did not result favorably to Quay.

A NEW and useless court, called the Appellate Court, with seven judges, was created by the legislature, besides creating several new president judges. All unnecessary, as the courts and judges of our state are having an easy time of it.

The general appropriation bill just passed by the late Legislature appropriates \$1,369,816.48 to pay "the salaries of the state officers, and clerks and incidental expenses of the same." Under Pattison the appropriation for the same purposes was \$552,659.26. Or an increase now upwards of a million dollars.

On Saturday last ended the most corrupt, worthless and extravagant legislature in the history of Pennsylvania. Its record is one of new and useless offices created, salaries of old offices raised, legislating for monopolies and trusts, and scandalously wasting the funds of the taxpayers over three millions beyond the revenues.

The Appellate Court bill has passed and will in all probability be signed by the governor. It creates seven new judges and a new court will be added to the Commonwealth. This court will stand between the district court and the Supreme Court of the State. It will be a sort of sinecure for political hacks and a big expense to the taxpayers.

A ROAD bill has been passed. The Flinn road bill, giving counties the right to construct county roads and to levy a tax for their maintenance, passed finally. The measure provides that the recommendation of the county commissioners shall first be passed upon by the grand jury and approved by the court before the roads can be improved. This is the first of the score or more road bills introduced in this legislature to pass finally.

It is alleged that there are in Kansas twenty well-built towns without a single inhabitant. Saratoga in that state has a \$30,000 opera house, a large brick hotel, a \$20,000 school house and a number of fine business houses, and yet there is not a single person to claim that city as his home. At Fargo a herder and his family constitute the sole population of what was once an incorporated city. These would be capital towns to go to for low rents.

It now turns out that the revenue bill, over which a Tax Conference has been sitting for four years, would yield 3 1/2 million dollars less revenue, annually, than is received by the state under the present law. In consequence of this fact the house committee very properly by a unanimous vote resolved to negative this abortion of four years breeding. There were some stupendous ignoramuses on this Tax Conference, and as usual, made asses of themselves in the minds of all intelligent men.

REVENUE BILL KILLED. There are astounding disclosures after four years' defective work by the Tax Commission, upon which there sat some astounding block-heads, as their work now turns out to be millions short of the mark. The Record says Auditor General

Mylin appeared before the Senate Finance Committee and made the astonishing declaration that, after a most careful examination, he had come to the conclusion that the General Revenue bill evolved by the Tax Conference after four years' work, would cause the revenues of the state to fall fully \$3,500,000 below those under the present or Boyer bill.

Corporation Clerk Glenn followed the Auditor General with a most startling array of figures, showing that every county in the State, except Philadelphia and Allegheny, drew more money out of the State Treasury than they paid in, some making as much as \$250,000 out of the State.

Chairman Ritter, of the House Ways and Means Committee, also asked to be heard on the bill; but as he was unfamiliar with the Auditor General's figures, he did not get very far before he asked for some time in which to examine them. He decided that he could not get over the subject before next evening, and he was given until that time, although Chairman Grady warned him that, in view of the Auditor General's figures, the committee was unanimous for negating the bill.

Frank N. Moore, who represented the grangers of the House in the Tax Conference, admitted he was beginning to see where they had made their mistake in figuring on the estimated revenue.

From the above it would seem the fellows who were looking after the interests of the farmers in the tax-bill did not understand the matter, and instead of bringing the farmers out ahead they would have been left in the lurch on taxes to the tune of 3 1/2 million dollars. The farmers need intelligent men for leaders, and less blowpipes, who couldn't see thro their own tax-bill after working on it four years.
