One of the Oldest Citizens of Our Commu-

Yesterday Alexander Kerr, of near Centre Hill, one of the oldest and most highly respected citizens of our valley, entered on the 91st year of his age. It has been the custom of his age. It has been the custom of his ed. children, Mrs. Mary Odenkirk, David, and William Kerr, for many years to meet at their father's home on that day and celebrate with him on that occasion.

On Wednesday his three children, together with his grand-children and great-grand-children, met at his home to celebrate with him this his 91st year, thus showing their love and re-

spect for their aged parent. Mr. Kerr for the past two years has been quite feeble and not able to leave the house, and for several months past has been confined to his bed, his mind at times wandering, and not able to recognize his children, and at his extreme age and the feeble condition of his health it is hardly expected that he can live to celebrate many birthdays. He has been a successful farmer and a useful citizen all his life.

An Important Decision.

Judge Love, of the common please court of this county, has just handed down a decision which will be of interest in all parts of the state. It was on the verdict rendered in the case of the Poor District of Rush township, vs. Austin Linn, poor overseer. The action was a feigned issue on appeal of the defendant from the settlement of his accounts by the township auditors when they refused to allow him a credit of \$86.50 for the use of a house owned by him and occupied by paupers and for sundry supplies furnished

The plaintiffs maintained that, according to the act of March 31, 1860, the overseer had no right to furnish supplies or a house to paupers with the expectation to get pay for the same. In his decision Judge Love decided otherwise, and held that the act referred to did not cover the office of a township overseer of the poor, as, in many cases, unless they would be allowed to furnish supplies, etc., paupers as well as many deserving people who occasionally need aid from the district might experience great suffering before the necessary help could be furnished. And as there is a heavy penalty attached to an overseer who fails to do his duty when applied to promptly, the judge held that they could furnish supplies or a place of residence and recover pay for the same at current prices.

This has been a mooted question in many parts of the state for years, and this is the first decision that has been lishes a precedent for other districts and overseers.
