A FRENCH naval engineer named d'Humy has invented a pressed oil-cake for use as fuel on ocean steamers. A ton of this fuel is equal to 30 tons of coal, and costs between five and ten dollars. JUDGE Doty, of Westmoreland county, has handed down a decision that will be of great interest to justices of the peace and constables in Centre county. Concerning the rumors that the governor is willing to "compromise", Herbert Welsh's "City and State" says: Governor Hastings is getting into shape to accept the overtures of Quay and Cameron. However much he may profess his love and loyalty to those men who stood with him in the late chairmanship contest, there can no longer be any doubt that he is getting ready to march under the colors of those whom he so recently opposed. It is quite certain now that he will be one of the delegates-at-large to the national convention with Quay, Cameron, Lyon, Stone, Merriek, Penrose and one other not yet selected. Within the next six months there will be some interesting developments in state

politics, and the governor will be found working in entire harmony with the Quay machine. His friends who discuss the matter can see nothing in a future alliance with Martin and Magee, and they feel that these two municipal bosses did not do the right thing in the chairmanship fight.
