THE investigation into the stealings under the governments of Philadelphia and Pittsburg, have exposed astounding rottenness. Fraudulent payrolls, frauds in contracts, frauds in furnishing supplies, frauds in everything and millions of dollars wrung from the tax-payers that enriched Republican officials, and the way things were run at Harrisburg last winter was like unto it.

WHO took care of us farmers' interests at Harrisburg last winter? The price of coal oil doubled, monopolies and trusts fostered, new and useless offices created, and high salaries raised higher yet! O, for some one to have watched the interests of us farmers! Even the hawks, crows and peevish had champions, to economically zoologize, but us farmers didn't have any one to care a darn for us.

THE most critical time in the life of political parties is not when they are engaged in contest for mastery, but afterward when victory having been achieved they undertake to deal with results. The division of the spoil and the peril of administration test to the utmost party vigor and vitality. Between this time and Thanksgiving day a year hence if the Republican party with its unwieldy preponderance in Congress and the ticklish task before it in choosing a Presidential candidate and marking out a policy of procedure does not fritter away its strength and lose its hold upon popular favor it will indeed be remarkable.

DON Cameron seems to have a poor chance for re-election to the U. S. Senate, many Republicans are setting their faces against him. There are several reasons why he should not be re-elected; one is that he is a man of no ability and not competent to represent the great Keystone state—he has been in the Senate nearly 18 years and never was heard from, a 14 year old school boy could have done as well. Another reason is, he is a free silverite contrary to the sentiment of five-sixths of the people of our state.

In Lancaster county there is a strong movement against Cameron, led by state senator Kauffman. In other counties the same feeling is spreading among Republicans and Cameron's friends have no hope of his re-election.

THE WHY OF IT.

Do you know that you are paying interest on about \$67,000,000 more than you were on the 4th of March, 1893, and that the persistency with which the treasury's outgo exceeds its income, indicates that still another bond sale will be necessary? And do you know why?—*Altoona Tribune.*

Yes, and so do you, but you will not be manly enough to admit the plain facts.

It is because the Reed billion-dollar Congress wasted the \$100,000,000 surplus that Harrison found in the treasury when he succeeded Cleveland.

It is because the fatal Sherman silver-purchase law took ten millions out of the treasury to give it to western silver mine owners.

It is because the McKinley trade killing tariff, besides reducing the revenue, brought on a panic from which we are not yet recovered.

It is because tens of millions were paid in bounties to Louisiana sugar thieves while other tens of millions were diverted from the Government's revenues into the coffers of the sugar trust.

It is because tens of millions were riotously wasted on a useless and dangerous navy.

It is because the credit of the country was all but destroyed by the infamous policy of Harrison and his discredited and now bankrupt Secretary of the Treasury.

In short, it is because the "Lord didn't" in 1888 and cursed us with four years of Harrisonism, McKinleyism and Shermanism. Otherwise we would now be paying interest on a public debt reduced by \$200,000,000 or more.—*Johnstown Democrat.*

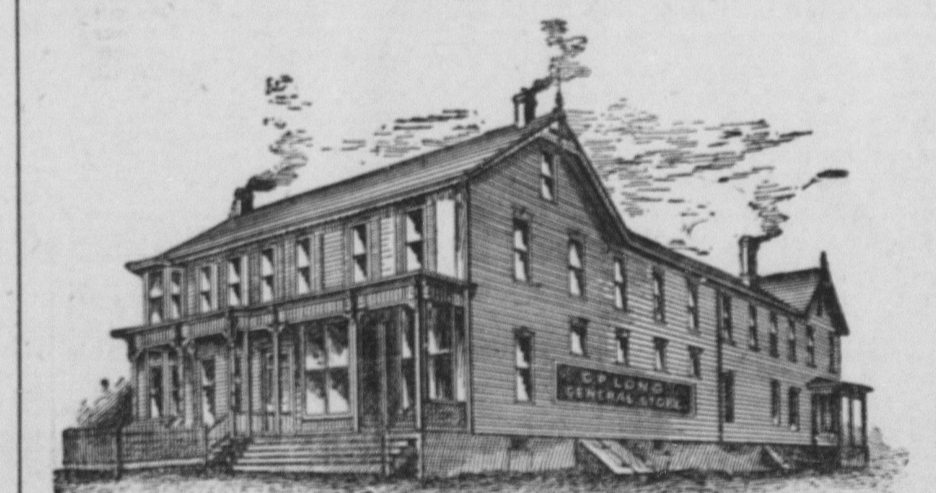
