THE Republicans now having control of both houses of congress, get up on the highest rail of the fence, and look for the good things promised.

CONGRESS met on Monday. The Republicans organized the house by electing Tom Reed speaker, and Major Alexander McDowell, of Penn'a, chief clerk.

THE prohibition army of this county holds its own heroically—at each general election it polls about 200 to 250 votes, a uniformity that is commendable, and it does not take a big sum to treat that crowd.

MR. CLEVELAND'S MESSAGE.

The President in his message has calmly met the requirements of the hour. He counsels wisely and with patriotic earnestness.

He attributes the commercial troubles under which we have for more than two years been suffering to the pernicious legislation which compelled the governmental purchase of silver heedless of sound business rules and our currency needs. For more than fifteen years this run on, undermining abroad confidence in our financial ability and integrity and "at last culminated in disaster and panic at home. A Democratic congress stopped this reckless scheme by a repeal of the laws which forced it upon us and we are now compelled to seek a remedy for the ills it left as a bitter legacy.

The President does not believe with Mr. Reed that waiting is a cure for our commercial distress. He suggests the retirement and cancellation of the United States notes called "greenbacks" and the notes issued for the purchase of silver under the act of 1890. For their redemption he proposes the issuance of a low rate, long term bond by which, in turn, gold may be added to our currency in lieu of these notes.

He condemns afresh the dangers of the free silver theory and appeals to its advocates to more deeply consider the scheme they propose, warning them that the mere agitation of their propositions while doing no good results in much harm. A debt honestly made should be honestly paid, he contends, and such obligation cannot be fairly met by the tender of a depreciated currency.

As to the tariff laws, the president makes no suggestions other than expressing his satisfaction with existing statutes. He believes that with economical government and honest administration they will supply adequate revenue for the country's needs and beyond this they should not go. We can not fairly have a favored class in this republic and high protective duties mean nothing else.

The document is a thoughtful and sensible one, practical and patriotic, and will command most respectful attention to be followed, we trust, by speedy and necessary congressional action.—Harrisburg Patriot.
