Yesterday morning, Wednesday, Boalsburg lost one of its well-known and popular characters, who was found dead in his bed, at his home. His death was sudden, apparently, and was due likely to a stroke of paralysis, or heart failure.

For years Mr. Coxe drove the hack and carried the mail from Boalsburg to the Oak Hall station, and there were few in this valley who were not acquainted with him.

He was aged over sixty years, and leaves a wife and several children all grown. He was an uncle of General Coxe, of the Commonwealth Army fame, who made himself famous by his march from Ohio to Washington with an army of tramps. The uncle did not approve of the actions of his nephew.

He will be buried at Boalsburg on Friday morning.

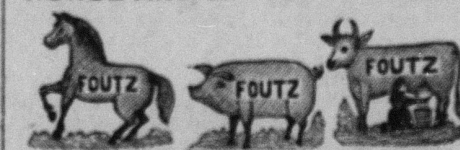

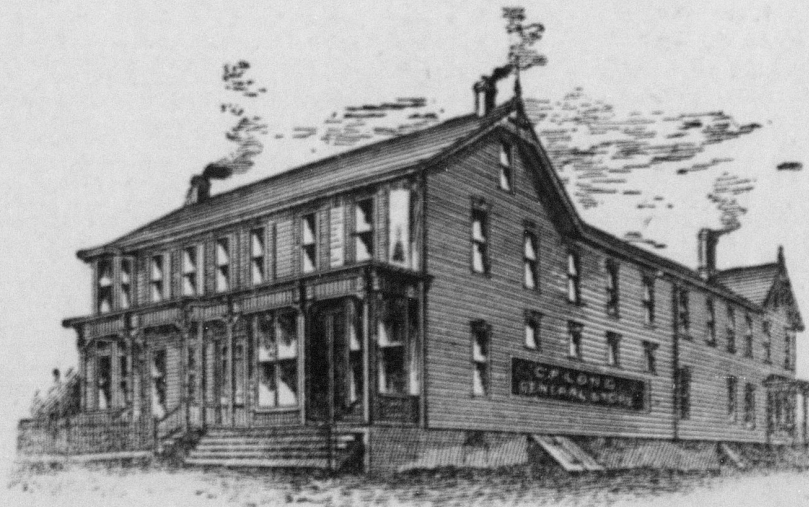
