Texr: "And I beheld another beast coming up out of the earth, and he had two horns like a lamb, and he spake as a dragon. -Revelation xiii., 11.

Is America mentioned in the Bible? Learned and consecrated men who have studied the inspired books of Daniel and Revelation more than I have and understand them better agree in saying that the leopard mentioned in the Bible meant Grecia, and the beer meant Medo-Persia, and the lion meant Babylon, and the beast of the text coming up out of the earth, with two horns like a lamb and the voice of a dragon, means our country, because among other reasons it seemed to come up out of the earth when Columbus discovered it, and it has been for the most part at peace like a lamb unless as-saulted by foreign foe, in which case it has two horns strong and sharp and the voice of a dragon loud to make all Nations hear the roar of its indignation. Is it reasonable to suppose that God would leave out from prophecies of His book this whole western hemisphere? No, no! "I beheld another beast coming up out of the earth, and he had two borns like a lamb, and he spake as a dragon.

PENSIONERS ON THE ROLL.

Secretary Smith Gives the Senate Some

Interesting Facis. In response to a resolution, the Secretary the Interior informed the Senate that there were, January 1, 1896, pensioners on the rolls as follows: General law, 454,876, of whom 100,714 are widows, mothers, children, etc.; under act of June 27, 1890, 481,231, o which 102,822 are widows, mothers, children, etc.; war of 1812, 3583, of which 3567 are widows and 16 survivors; war with Mexico, 20,165, of which 12,241 are survivors and 7924 widows; Indian wars of 1832-1842, 6979, of which 2867 are survivors and 4112 widows. Grand total, 966,834. July 1, 1895, this grand

total was 970,524. The total loss to the roll from July 1, 1895. to January 1, 1896, is 21,112. During the six months covered by the inquiry pension certificates were issued as follows: Under the general law, 3550; act of 1890, 13,314; under sundry acts, 618; total originals, 17,482. Reissues amounted to 26,443; total of all

classes, 42,925. During the six months period, 3417 cases were dropped for destructive causes, as fol-lows: For disability ceased, 2320; on account of desertion and deficient military service. 169; on account of fraudulent testimony, 83; for victous habits, 18; for immorality, 102 (all of whom were widows); on account of disloyalty of soldiers, 537; for non-dependence, 46; for being pensioned under other laws, 39; disability or death not due to the service, 93; on account of re-enlistment, 2; soldiers on whose account claim was made found to be still living, 4; declarations being

COST OF THE CUBAN WAR.

The Spaniards Say They Have Spent \$50,000,000 in a Year.

Madrid papers'contain some curious official statistics regarding the war in Cuba. Acacording to these there were sent to the island up to March, 1896, 118,000 men. Thirteen thousand of these were sent at the time of the outbreak of the rebellion. The cost of the war thus far is placed at \$50,000,000. For the second year the cost is estimated at \$75,000,000. Each soldier in Cuba costs the Government \$500 annually. During the first year 406 scidiers were killed and 3472 died from yellow fever.

The Havana correspondent of the London Pall Mail Gazette says that Captain-General Weyler will no more suppress the rebellion than did General Martinez Campos. The United States, he adds, should, on the score of humanity and her general political and financial interests, insist on autonomy for the Cubans.

Two Kinds of Heroism.

No one is irretrievably lost in whom the sense of honor survives. A Paris paper recounts the case of a woman who had been arrested, convicted of some offense, and sentenced to imprisonment. A detective was taking her to the prefecture from Boulogne-sur-Seine, by steamer, when at the Concorde bridge a well-dressed man threw himself into the river and was drowning before their eyes.

The officer was a brave man and an excellent swimmer; it cost him a struggle to see a life lost which he might save, if he were free to act.

"If I were alone," he exclaimed, "I would save that man." "Save him," said the woman. "I will

wait for you at the pier." The officer hesitated for an instant, and then plunged into the water. He had barely seized the drowning man when a boat struck him violently, and he lost his grip. He dived again, but vainly, and at last, quite exhausted, was pulled into a small boat, which itself narrowly escaped collision with a

The heroic officer was cheered by the erowd who had witnessed his bravery, and the body of the man he had striven to save was recovered later. But his was not the only honorable conduct shown, for on the pier the woman, true to her word, was waiting for the detective, and handed him his coat, in the pocket of which was the warrant upon which she had been arrested.

One is glad to learn that her honorable conduct will not go unappreciated. When it was reported to the chief of the department he immediately ordered the prisoner to be released in recognition of her humanity and honor.

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


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
