The congregation has been using the Methodist church, and had hoped that arrangements could be made whereby the property could be purchased by them, but apparently all deals are off.

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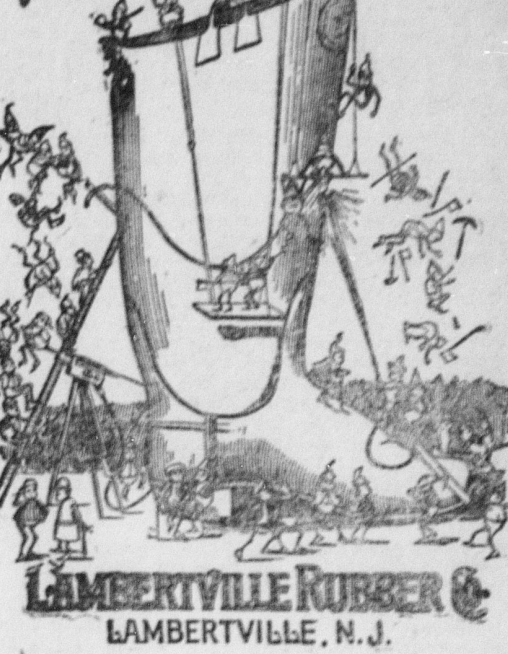
