Who hit Centre county's favorite son just as spring set in and the robbins begin to sing and the biuebirds to chirp? This was a Republican mistake, and it may be Reeder was confounded with Reed, who is getting wholloped by the McKinleyites. Still the last syllable to Reeder's name should have saved him from being mistaken as the man from Maine -this a Czar, that a Colonel.

McKinley still seems to take the lead in the Republican race for the presidential nomination, and now there is a Reed shaken by the wind. Quay does not yet have a delegate outside of our own state, and some counties have stepped over him and instructed for McKinley.

THE Republican primaries held in this county last Saturday, resulted in 6 to 1 in favor of McKinley over Quay for President. This will prove a stunner to Quay, and shatter his boom badly in the state and give the McKinley machine an impetus in this state that will prove of national importance and be far-reaching in its effects. It sounds almost like the beginning of the downfall of Quay, and from this on there will be a fire all along the Republican lines to overthrow Quay and Quay influences. Judge Beaver expressed himself in favor of Quay but took ne part in last Saturday's contest.
