The bill is intended as a revenue raiser, and a revenue raiser of some kind is very necessary, as the very legislature that passed the resolution of inquiry also passed appropriation bills, the payment of which compels the State Treasurer to draw upon the tax income of the State for next year to meet the expenditures of this.

The revenues of the State, ample as they have been in the past, are not sufficient to meet the requirements of the late reform Legislature, whose appropriations are nearly \$3,000,000 beyond the revenue limit. The tax conference must therefore be regarded as a timely thing.—*Philad. Times.*
