S. S. Convention.

A Centre county S. S. convention will be held at the court house in Bellefonte, May 20, '96. The forenoon session will begin at ten o'clock; the afternoon session at 2 o'clock, and evening at 7.30.

The following state workers are on the programme and will address the convention during each session. Rev. C. J. Kephart, D. D., general secretary of Pennsylvania State Sabbath School Association; Mrs. J. W. Barnes, primary superintendent, and Prof. H. U. Roop, Normal Instructor, and a number of Sabbath school workers of the county are expected to take part in the discussion.

Each school in the county is requested to send at least two delegates. Free entertainment will be furnished to all in attendance.

All ministers and Superintendents are members of the convention if in attendance.

There Will be High Water.

According to the theory of an old fisherman, there will be high water all summer. The basis of this idea is the fact that the fish in the small streams are spawning in shallow water this spring. An Exclusive Water Right.

Justice Fell handed down a decision on Wednesday, in the Supreme Court in the case of the Gas and Water Company of Downingtown, against the corporation of the borough of Downingtown. It is decided that the company has the exclusive right to furnish the borough with water. This applies to all water companies in the state, that they have the exclusive right to supply water.
