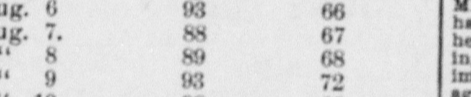

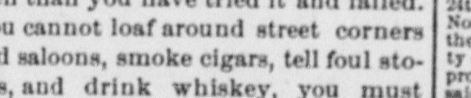

AN ORDINANCE.—

Authorizing the levy and collection of a license tax on hacks, cabs, omnibuses, wagons, and other vehicles used in carrying persons or property for pay in the Borough of Centre Hall.

Section 1. Be it enacted by the burgesses and council of the borough of Centre Hall, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, that all hacks, carriages, omnibuses, wagons, and other vehicles, used upon the streets and alleys of the borough in carrying persons and property for pay, shall be liable to an annual license tax as follows:

Table with 2 columns: Vehicle type, License tax. Rows include Hacks and carriages, Omnibuses, Express or freight wagons, Baggage wagons, Other wagons using one horse, Other wagons using two horses, Other wagons using four or more horses.

The said tax shall be paid to the treasurer of the borough on or before the 1st day of August of each year, and it shall be the duty of the treasurer, upon the payment of said tax, to issue a license to the person paying, authorizing him to use the vehicle upon which the tax has been paid.

Section 2. Each license taken out shall bear the number of the vehicle on which the license is paid shall have the number printed upon it. The borough treasurer shall furnish duplicate license receipts for all licenses taken out, to the chief of police.

Section 3. If any person shall use any hack, carriage, wagon or other vehicle, in carrying persons or property for pay, within the borough, without having paid said license tax, he shall be liable to a penalty of twenty dollars for each offence, to be collected by suit in the name of the borough before the chief burgess or name of the borough before the chief burgess or name of the borough before the chief burgess.

Section 4. This ordinance shall apply to all vehicles used in carrying persons or property within the borough, or between points within the borough and other points or places, whether the owner reside, or the vehicles be kept within the borough or not.

AN ORDINANCE.—

Declaring the public highway in the Borough of Centre Hall, being formerly a part of the Centre and Kishacoquillas Turnpike, a public street under the jurisdiction of said Borough.

Section 1. Be it enacted by the Town Council assembled and it is hereby enacted by authority of the same, That Pennsylvania Avenue in said Borough, extending from the Centre Hall to the northern line thereof and being formerly a portion of the Centre and Kishacoquillas Turnpike be and the same is hereby declared a public street of said Borough, as now laid out, opened and used, over which the said Borough shall have all needed jurisdiction.
