This Councilman Was Bounced.

The Supreme Court on Monday handed down a decision in the quo warranto proceedings to oust A. J. De Camp from his office as councilman on account of a contract to furnish light in the city of Philadelphia, a case which has excited considerable interest among the city fathers of many Pennsylvania towns.

The defendant, Andrew J. De Camp, was secretary of the Brush Electric Light company at the time that corporation received a contract to furnish the city of Philadelphia with light and was shortly afterwards elected a member of the city's council. It was claimed by the commonwealth that the defendant was interested in said contract and had no right to assume the duties of common councilman or continue to exercise the same.

The judgment of the lower court in ousting the defendant from the office of councilman was affirmed. It is unlawful for councilmen, or any public officer, to be interested directly or indirectly, in any work or contract whatever, coming under the board of which he is a member, whether it be for roads, hauling, or any kind of labor. Fine and imprisonment are the penalties for it.

A Large Family.

A correspondent of the Pittsburg Post, writing from Martins Ferry, Ohio, says: "Charles Brandow, of company F, Ohio volunteer infantry, is one of a family of 33 children, 28 being boys and 5 girls. Eleven of the boys were in the Mexican war, 16 in the war of the rebellion, one of whom died in prison, and one was killed. He himself was two years and four months in Andersonville prison. Fourteen of the children are still living. In 1861 the family were Democrats, but voted the Republican ticket from 1863 till this year. There are now 536 voters in the family, all of whom will vote for William J. Bryan and free silver. The family live in Belmont county, Ohio."

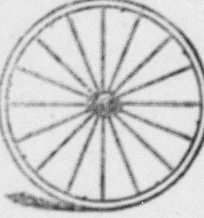
