Think About It.

Are your scales correct? A gentleman recently made a statement in this office that will bear looking into. He had occasion a few days since to ascertain the weight of an article and to determine the same visited several business stands, having a draught of the article made at each point, and was surprised at the result after having been at but four points. At two of the stores the weight tallied exactly, but at the others there was a wide discrepancy, as much as one pound in ten in one case, and almost half as much in the other. To protect their trade and reputation all merchants should test their scales and weights occasionally, and know for a certainty that they are what they ought to be.—Huntingdon Local News.

Of Interest to School Teachers.

School teachers will be interested in a case tried some time ago in Chambersburg, this state. A boy had kicked a little girl on the play grounds at recess. When school was dismissed the boy was called forward for punishment, but refused to go, and when force was used he drew a knife upon the teacher. The latter conquered, however, and gave the lad a thrashing which drew blood. The father of the boy had the teacher arrested for assault and battery. 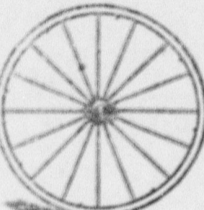
