A Prisoner to Get Short Rations. In sentencing Paul Tonetska to four months' imprisonment in the county jail, Judge Ikler, of Danville, delivered a remarkable judicial utterance in order to impose the strictest penalty upon the prisoner. The Judge instructed Sheriff Breckbill to make Tonetska's imprisonment "as hard as possible, and to allow him to receive only enough food to sustain life" as long as he remained in jail. The Judge also stated from the bench that he was sorry that it was impossible to sentence Tonetska to the penitentiary, owing to its crowded condition.
