Resolved, Therefore that, in the untimely death of our sister, our church has lost an earnest and faithful member and co-worker.

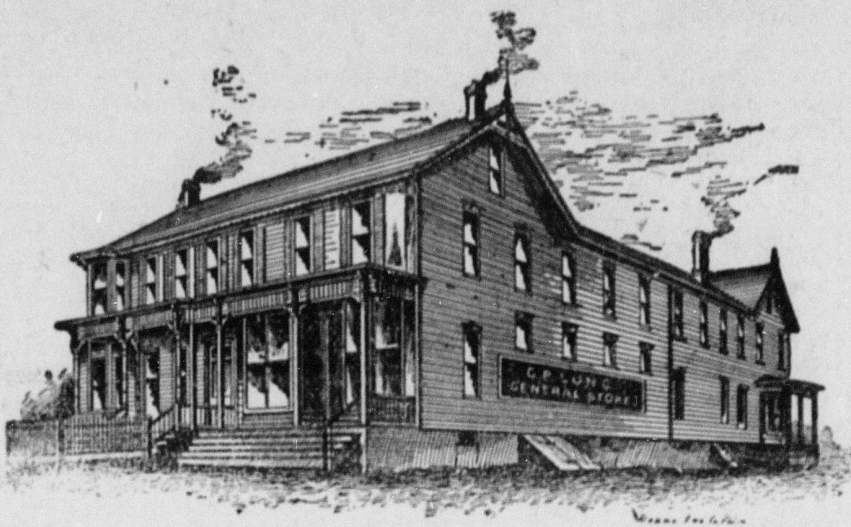

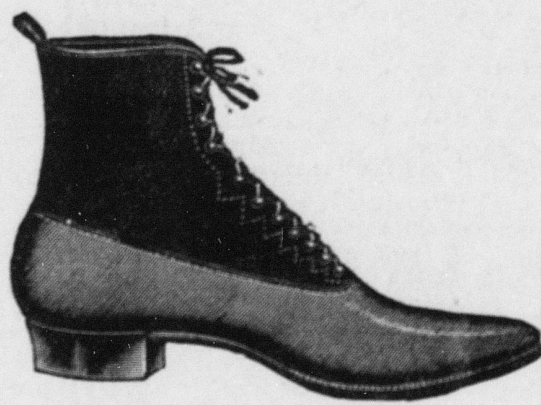
