Son of Judge Beaver and College Secretary of the Y. M. C. A.

Hugh McAllister Beaver, the second son of Superior Court Judge James A. Beaver, died at his father's home in Bellefonte, Monday morning.

The deceased was taken suddenly ill with appendicitis on Thursday evening. Physicians were hurriedly summoned, but the disease had reached such an advanced stage that it was deemed unwise to operate upon him.

He gradually grew weaker, and Monday morning passed away. He was twenty-four years old and was the college secretary of the state Young Men's Christian association. The funeral was held Wednesday at 3 p. m.

Judge and Mrs. Beaver have our deepest sympathy in the death of their son Hugh, who was a model young man and an honor to his mourning parents. He was widely known for his shining virtues.

The Number of Vehicles.

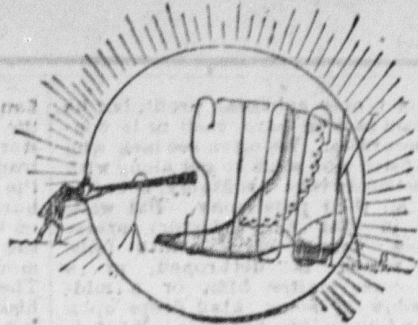
