NEW GOLD FINDS.

Two Men from Pittston Get \$85,000 Each.—Golden Accounts.

F. O'Reilly, Frank Flanigan and P. O'Brien have arrived at Tacoma from Klondike, and claim to have \$85,000 each in dust, nuggets and drafts issued at Dawson. They left Klondike on July 6 and were the last men out, having come overland via Skaguay. O'Reilly says there were nearly six tons of dust, worth over \$2,000,000, at Dawson when they left. The owners in most instances were going to St. Michael on the next river steamer and coming down on the steamers Portland and Excelsior.

Flanigan and O'Brien are in Portland, and will leave for their old home in Pittston. O'Reilly will winter in Ireland. They went to Yukon two years ago, and after a year of fruitless prospecting secured claims 37 and 39 on Bonanza Creek, which they expect to yield \$500,000. They claim to have a pay streak sixty feet wide for 200 feet along the creek bottom and have worked only eight feet of its length.

They estimate that the Klondike district will produce fully \$10,000,000 this winter. An immense area on the Yukon remains unprospected, and other streams no less rich will be found.

Two years ago O'Reilly was a section foreman on the Northern Pacific Railway. He was discharged for drinking and started for Yukon. Dawson, he says, now has 3500 people.

Saloons and gambling houses occupy the best buildings. Every one gambles and drinks. He advises none to start North this fall, and says many of those now rushing in will leave their bones on the trail.

Interesting Data.

The Bellefonte correspondent to the Williamsport Grit furnishes the following interesting data: Centre county contains 14,524 taxables, 195,471 acres of cleared land, and 141,837 acres of timber land. The assessed value of real estate in the county is \$12,741,252; value of real estate exempt from taxes is \$2,575,140, leaving the value of real estate taxable at \$11,166,102. There are 7,292 horses, mares, and mules over four years old in the county, valued at \$236,860, and 7,546 cattle, over four years old, the assessed value being \$107,479. Salaries, emoluments of office, post of profits, trades, etc., are valued at \$467,097. The aggregate value of all property taxable for county purposes at three mills on a dollar is \$11,977,546; the county tax on that amount is \$35,932.64. The amount of money on interest in the county, including mortgages, judgments, bonds, notes, stocks, etc., is \$2,739,290. Omnibuses, stages, hacks, cabs, etc., in the county are valued at \$3,153. The total amount of property subject to four mills tax on a dollar, including stages, money at interest, etc., is \$2,742,443, the taxes on same being \$2,969.53. The state refunds to the county three-fourths of the latter sum.
