Highwayman Fatally Wounded.

Last Thursday night three negroe held up and robbed three boys who were driving on the road near Philipsburg. Shortly afterwards David Bailey and Charles Truax, of Morrisdale, were held up by the same men. About one o'clock Friday morning, Lee Hudson and Edward Way, of Philipsburg, were driving between Munson and Osceola, when they were covered with guns by two colored men, while a third proceeded to relieve them of their valuables. Way resisted and was shot in the chin. Friday morning Philipsburg officers started in pursuit of the highwaymen, and traced them to Tyrone. At 11:30 o'clock Friday morn. held up and robbed three boys wh rone. At 11:30 o'clock Friday morning, officer Simler, of Philipsburg, encountered on Lincoln avenue, Tyrone, three colored men, who answered the description of the highwaymen.
