Highwayman Fatally Wounded.

Last Thursday night three negroes held up and robbed three boys who were driving on the road near Phillipsburg. Shortly afterwards David Bailey and Charles Truax, of Morrisdale, were held up by the same men. About one o'clock Friday morning, Lee Hudson and Edward Way, of Phillipsburg, were driving between Munson and Osceola, when they were covered with guns by two colored men, while a third proceeded to relieve them of their valuables. Way resisted and was shot in the chin. Friday morning Phillipsburg officers started in pursuit of the highwaymen, and traced them to Tyrone. At 11:30 o'clock Friday morning, officer Simler, of Phillipsburg, encountered on Lincoln avenue, Tyrone, three colored men, who answered the description of the highwaymen. When he attempted to arrest them two of the negroes drew revolvers, and all of them started to run. The one who was apparently unarmed was caught and turned over to spectators. Simler then pursued the other two, and, seeing that they were likely to get away, fired at them, and one of the fugitives dropped, shot through the back. The wounded man was taken to the Altoona hospital and the ball extracted from the abdomen. The injured man gave his name as James Lee, of Brooklyn, aged 22, single, occupation cook. He was supposed to be dying Friday night. The third man has not yet been taken.

28 KILLED IN A WRECK.

Special Train Thrown Into the Hudson River by a Washout. On Sunday morning a Buffalo and New York special on the New York Central and Hudson river railroad was thrown from the track into the Hudson river near Garrison's station. 28 lives were lost. The retaining wall along the river had been undermined by high water in the river, and the track caved under the weight of the train. The train consisted of the engine, a combination baggage and express car, a smoker, two ordinary coaches and four sleepers. The engine and two forward cars are submerged in fifty feet of water. Engineer Foyle and Fireman Tompkins went down with the engine. All the sleeping car passengers escaped.

Charley Taylor of this city, also an old soldier and a member of the 188th regiment, had a half brother who went by this name, from whom he was separated fifty years ago, and learning that a man by this name was present at the reunion, looked him up and found him to be his half brother. Fifty years ago, while living at Tipton, Charley left home and from that day until this reunion had never seen Thomas, nor known definitely concerning his whereabouts. They both went through the war, but never once came in contact with each other. The strange thing about the matter is that they both have lived in Centre county a good portion of the time, Charley in this city and Thomas in Bald Eagle valley.—Phillipsburg Journal.
